Re: *Ex Parte* Communication of ACA Connects – America’s Communications Association: Expanding Flexible Use of the 3.7 to 4.2 GHz Band, GN Docket No. 18-122

Dear Ms. Dortch:

On August 29, 2019, I had a telephone conversation with Mr. Aaron Goldberger, Wireless & International Advisor to Chairman Pai, regarding the above-referenced proceeding.

During the call, I informed Mr. Goldberger that ACA Connects – America’s Communications Association (“ACA Connects”) continues to engage in conversations about the 5G Plus Plan with MVPD programmers that use the C-band for delivery of video programming and have participated in the proceeding. I then updated him on ACA Connects’ progress in preparing a detailed supplement to its original proposal.¹ As I explained, the supplemental material, which ACA Connects intends to file soon, will lay out in detail how the fiber network would be designed, established, launched, maintained, and paid for, particularly the part of the network that connects programmers to data centers. I emphasized that the network would provide the MVPD industry with the same or better reliability than what they receive from satellite providers via the C-band.
